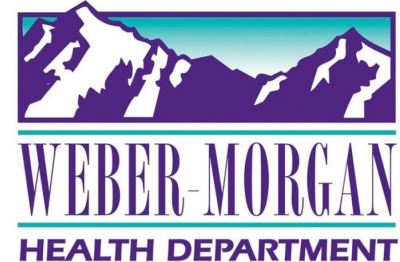

COVID-19 Vaccine

Coronavirus vaccinations are underway and steadily becoming more and more available to the community. The Weber-Morgan Health Department has important information to disclose to help Ogden City residents be most informed regarding the vaccine. Please keep in mind that information is often changing through the process of obtaining vaccines. Please visit the Weber-Morgan Health Department website at webermorganhealth.org for current information and updates.



The groups currently eligible for the vaccine are healthcare and behavioral health workers, EMS, first responders, K-12 educators, and residents ages 70 and older. The number of vaccines are limited and you must have an appointment to receive your vaccination. New appointment slots are made available weekly on Thursdays at 3 p.m. You can find this link on the homepage of the Weber-Morgan Health Department website. If any resident has language barriers, physical limitations, or any other problems scheduling an appointment, there are Weber-Morgan Health Department staff who are happy to help!

The Weber-Morgan Health Department is holding mass clinics following the distribution timeline set forth by the federal and state government. The distribution timeline can also be found on the department's website. One of the clinics is currently held at the Dee Events Center every week, as well as school districts for K-12 educators. Through the process of receiving a dose of the vaccine, there are a few things to be mindful of before your appointment.

- **When you arrive, you will go through the designated entrance (For the Dee Events Center you will enter on the east side).**
- **You will then be screened for your appointment. Make sure you bring a Utah State Issued ID with you or some other official form of identification such as a passport.**
- **Patrons who are not scheduled for an appointment will be given directions on how to schedule one and then asked to leave.**
- **After the screening, you will advance to registration where your information will be verified, and then patrons will receive a vaccination card.**
- **Patrons will then move into the area to receive the vaccine. After receiving the vaccine, patrons are asked to wait 15 minutes at the clinic.**
- **Those who need support should only bring one caregiver through the point of dispensing.**
- **Those who have had COVID-19 are asked to wait 90 days before receiving the vaccine.**

The whole process currently takes about 30 minutes or less, but the Weber-Morgan Health Department asks to be prepared to wait because the staff is limited and adapting to changes as new information comes.

After receiving the vaccine, residents will still need to take current protective measures including social distancing, wearing a mask, etc. The vaccine does not become fully effective until about two weeks after the second dose. The overall goal is to get into the low-risk category statewide. The health department also aims to lower the ICU capacity rate.

When Will City Council Return to In-Person Meetings?

The COVID-19 pandemic has been challenging for many reasons and we've all had to adapt to living our lives differently, and Council Meetings are no exception.

Council meetings have been held electronically via Zoom since March 2020 when the pandemic reached the area. Although there are still many uncertainties as to when things will return to a new normal, Ogden City Council has carefully developed a tentative plan for meetings to return to the council chambers when it is safe to do so.



Measures are currently in place to ensure a safe return to chambers, including the installment of protective barriers on the dais to separate council members, staff, and administration. Seating assignments have also been adjusted to accommodate social distancing.

The council intends to initially return the council chambers using a hybrid-style meeting. Council members and required city staff would attend meetings in person with the capability of public engagement through Zoom. To make this possible, equipment upgrades have been installed in the council work room and chambers. As conditions continue to improve and it becomes safer for more people to congregate, the public will gradually be allowed to join the council in person.

Due to the uncertainty of the circumstances, there is no definitive timeline as to when meetings will return to chambers, but having this plan in place will provide a process to help maintain the safety of council members, city staff and citizens.

Emergency Preparedness Message: Earthquake Safety

Earthquakes can potentially damage property and threaten lives. Be prepared. In March of 2020, we experienced a 5.7 magnitude earthquake in Magna that was felt throughout the state. We live in a very seismically active region, and we may likely continue to experience these frightening and life-changing events. Utah's largest potential for earthquake activity is along the Wasatch Front, which also happens to have the highest concentration of residents in Utah. Seismic experts believe we are overdue for a large magnitude earthquake within our local community, and when it happens the public safety and emergency system will be heavily impacted. We must all be prepared.

What can you do now: Make a plan, get a kit, be informed, and get involved. Here are some things you should involve in preparing your home and family for an earthquake:

- **Move or secure heavy objects that could fall on you.**
- **Ensure your water heater and other major appliances are strapped down appropriately and have flexible connectors.**
- **Be ready to move away from windows.**
- **Store emergency supplies.**
- **Know emergency procedures and the locations you and your family are at. (School, home, work, etc.)**
- **Register for CODE RED on our website for emergency notifications.**
