WonderBlock

“As a mixed-use project woven into the heart of downtown Ogden, WonderBlock represents an important addition to our city’s capacity to support the defense ecosystem. As

a place where ideas and people come together, WonderBlock will support new economic opportunities for the benefit of our community,” says Sara Meess, Business Development Division Manager. WonderBlock helps to establish a new precedent for value and density in downtown Ogden. Additionally, the new catalytic development will attract and encourage additional community investments and enhance the city’s long-term sustainable economic vitality.

This development, located along 26th Street between Grant and Lincoln Avenues, will feature new housing, retail and office space, a downtown grocery, and a boutique hotel.

Ogden’s historic and vibrant downtown provides an ideal environment for innovation.

However, additional office space and housing options are still needed, along with gathering spaces that foster creative collisions to strengthen the city’s burgeoning defense ecosystem. A supportive ecosystem will accelerate the growth of existing and new businesses and create high-quality jobs for area residents.

After Ogden’s city council voted to fund WonderBlock, a key piece to the “Make Ogden” Master Plan, Council Member Marcia White said, “We need economic development; we need economic opportunity. The sort of tax revenue proponents says the WonderBlock plans will help the city fund other initiatives – pay hikes for police, plans to rebuild the Marshall White Center, the proposal to overhaul Union Station.”

Get A Free Tree For Your Parking Strip

Ogden’s tree-lined streets establish the character of our neighborhoods, and the trees we plant today will be enjoyed by generations to come. Each year,

the City provides a tree nursery so residents can get a free tree to plant in their parking strip that matches the needs for the yard and the plan for the street.

Beginning April 1st, every Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday from 8:00 a.m. - 12:00 p.m. trees will be given away. Please call the Parks & Cemetery Office at 801-629-8284 to schedule an appointment to pick up a tree (limit one per household) at Ogden’s Green Waste Facility located at 1845 Monroe Blvd. We will continue to give away trees until we run out of trees.

Residents must provide information about overhead-power lines, the length and width of their parking strip, and the lot location, as well as a current Ogden Water bill and picture ID. Please limit the number of people that come to the tree nursery to two individuals.

The Green Waste Facility also has an abundance of premium compost for sale @ \$3/bag or \$15/yard, wood chips @ \$10/yard, and mulch @ \$7/yard.

Dump Passes And Green Waste Passes Now Available

Green Waste Passes

The Ogden City Green Waste Site, located at 1845 Monroe Blvd, is a free service provided to Ogden City residents who pay Ogden City garbage fees. A Green Waste pass is required to dump *permitted natural waste at the site. Passes are acquired at the Public Works Building, located at 133 W 29th Street. In order to receive a pass, please bring a current picture ID. Residents must also either be listed on the current Ogden City Water Utility billing, or must show a current utility bill (power or gas) with their name and the Ogden City address located on the bill. The Green Waste passes are good for one year from the time of acquisition. Pass renewals are done in the same manner as initial passes.

*Permitted natural waste includes brush, leaves, grass clippings, and small tree branches. Roots, stumps, sod, and dirt are not accepted.

Dump Passes

2023 dump passes are now available through June 30th. These dump passes are given to help residents dispose of items that are not allowed in, or don't fit in, household cans. Two passes per residential Ogden City Water Utility account are available. Each pass is valued equivalent to the minimum load value and can be used together or separately at the Weber County Transfer Station. To obtain the dump passes, please bring a current picture ID and a current utility bill to the Public Works Building, located at 133 W 29th Street OR the Ogden City Community Services Building, located at 1875 Monroe Blvd. If the resident is on the current Ogden City Utility billing, that is sufficient. If you have questions specific to the dump passes, please call 801-629-8271.

Emergency Preparedness Message: Water Storage

Water stores are crucial for emergency preparedness, and containers can be acquired at little to no cost. A normally active person needs about three quarters of a

gallon of fluid daily, from water and other beverages. However, individual needs vary depending on age, health, physical condition, activity, diet and climate. Here are four tips to help you start organizing one of the most valuable preparedness essentials, water.

1. Store water in clean plastic containers. Avoid using containers that decompose or break, such as milk cartons or glass bottles. Look for the "HDPE" and "2" label on containers for safe, long-term storage.

2. Store one gallon of water per person per day. A regularly active person needs to drink at least two quarts of water each day. Children, nursing mothers, and ill people may need more, including water for pets.

3. Keep a minimum two-week supply at your home. For 72-hour kits, you can purchase commercially packaged long-term water packets, or water from a home tap can fill individual containers since it has previously been treated.

4. Ensure all your water is treated and stored correctly in a cool, dark, and dry area.

Water can be safely treated for consumption by boiling for 10-12 minutes or adding 6-10 drops of carefully measured bleach (1/8 tsp) per gallon of water (don't use a color-safe bleach).
