Marshall N. White Center Is Now Open

The Marshall N. White Community Center is now open, and we are thrilled to welcome the Ogden community to our new facility.

After a highly anticipated opening day on May 23, 2025, we're ready to serve residents of all ages with various programs, amenities, and services. This 68,000-square-foot facility includes a pool, indoor track, gym, classrooms, a kitchen, and many other amenities. This newly constructed facility honors the legacy of fallen Ogden Police Officer Marshall N. White and his enduring commitment to community service. "From the fields surrounding it to the art on its walls, the new Marshall N. White Center was designed with the Ogden community at its heart," said Justin Anderson, Ogden City's Executive Director of Public Services. "We've built a place where residents of all ages can keep learning and growing—whether through swimming, cooking, exercising, the arts, or the many other programs we're proud to offer. The Marshall N. White Center truly has something for everyone."

The original Marshall N. White Center was constructed in 1968, five years after Officer White was killed in the line of duty in 1963. It became the first city-owned building in Utah named for a person of color and served for over 50 years as a vital gathering place for generations of Ogden residents. With the support of Officer White's family, the Ogden City Council decided to demolish and rebuild the center on its historic site, ensuring it continues to meet the needs of this growing community.

Marcia White, Ogden City Council Chair, said, "We couldn't be more excited for this facility to be open to the Ogden community. We can't thank those who were involved enough for the hard work, attention to detail, and community focus that went into making this project possible."

With considerable community involvement, from the building design to the programs taught at the Marshall N. White Center, the opening of this space celebrates community collaboration and a shared vision of a thriving community where we connect, grow, and succeed. For generations, the center has been a cornerstone of community life in Ogden; now, future generations can carry that legacy forward.

While serving as a City Council Chair, I listened to residents and worked to keep the Marshall N. White Center in the same neighborhood because of the history and pride it fostered," said Ogden City Mayor Ben Nadolski. "Our renewed Marshall N. White Center is where folks of all ages and backgrounds can come together, make meaningful human connections, and grow. Our residents now have year-round access to affordable recreation that will improve their physical and mental well-being, creating a stronger, healthier Ogden City."

Make Ogden Updates

Zone Ogden – Development Code Update

Ogden City is updating all its development codes. The overall goal of Zone Ogden is to create a single document that includes all the codes and standards that are required to develop in Ogden. The final document will become Ogden City's Unified Development Code.

The consultant team, Logan Simpson LLC, and Ogden City held a Zone Ogden open house at the Union Station on May 28, 2025. They shared several posters highlighting the draft text of the development standards chapters of the development code, which included landscaping, parking, fencing, buffering, architectural standards, and more. Emergency Preparedness: Outdoor Fire Safety

As Summer approaches and dry weather persists, it's crucial to discuss fire safety, especially in areas prone to wildfires. Homeowners near open spaces should create a defensible space of at least 30 feet around their homes, keeping this zone clear of dead vegetation and debris. Utilizing fire-resistant materials for roofs and structures enhances safety, and access routes for emergency vehicles must be maintained.

Many local jurisdictions, including areas east of Harrison Blvd in Ogden, have implemented restrictions on open flames and fireworks to safeguard lives and property due to heightened wildfire risks. Residents living below Harrison should also exercise caution by ensuring it's a green burn day, attending to outdoor fires closely, and keeping extinguishing agents nearby. It's important to maintain fire pits safe distances from structures and overhead obstructions, and avoiding the use of flammable liquids. (50' for open burning, 25' fires inside a pit, and 15' for commercially manufactured portable fire pits) Stay safe and be proactive in fire prevention.
